The first time I met Peter Chillingworth had to be 22 years ago, though I cannot remember the exact moment as it seems I've known him my whole life. It is easy to imagine the encounter: Pete, with tam cap and wool blazer, giving me the "side eye" as my kids like to say, with a slight smile and likely a bit of a laugh on hello. Pete's side eye, I have come to observe, is really him sizing up a person and situation. Passing muster with Pete is pretty simple: have good manners, don't take yourself too seriously, and respect the stuff. The first time I visited Scenery Hill and spoke at length with Cappy, the mutual admiration society was sealed. The Chillingworths and I have many similarities, it seems: our West Virginia heritage, alumni of WVU (where Cappy and I both pledged Pi Beta Phi), and most importantly our love and appreciation for the ability to work in an industry as personal and interesting as antiques and art. I can't count the number of times Pete would remind me, "We aren't selling nuts and bolts, Amelia. It's far more important than that."

Our regular morning calls began, I think, mostly after Tom Porter passed away, and I called to give him the news before he read it in the papers. Pete took Tom's death as he takes the death of any of his many long standing friends in the antiques industry: with thoughtful pause and reflection and deep appreciation for the relationship and memories. My morning calls with Pete have become a welcome ritual throughout the past decade or so, and I am grateful for the perspective and insight he so generously shares with a friend half (don't hate me, Pete) his age.

It has been an honor and joy to listen to story after story about the things Pete has handled, and the people he has encountered along the way. Across hundreds of hours of work for this auction, I was consistently amazed that I would ring him with a question about a specific item, and Pete would instantly recount every detail, including where he bought it, when, and from whom. And, no matter the number of calls in a day, he always answered and ended the call with grace and gratitude for the work I was doing. Make no mistake, Peter Chillingworth has been a lifelong student and champion for the material he has handled (and sought to handle!), and letting it all go has been incredibly personal. As usual, Pete has approached it with encouragement for everyone involved and an astonishing instinct and fortitude for the process, including decisions to hold the auction onsite and absolute - two distinctions that could shake the most confident of sellers.

Any attempt to sum up a 60 year career in a few paragraphs would be lame, at best. It has been said that success can be measured by the lives we touch. If 60 years as an independent dealer in one of the most daunting, tough industries you can enter isn't proof of his success, then surely the collectors, dealers, historians, and museum professionals who count him as a friend are. It is my hope that The Chillingworth Auction is long remembered as an auction that honored my friends Pete and Cappy, but also the era to which they have belonged, identified, and to which they have dedicated the greater part of their lives.







ARTISTS

EMIL BOTT (AMERICAN/GERMAN, 1827 - 1908).

Born in Wurtenberg, Germany, Bott immigrated to America with his father. He lived in Phillipsburg and went to school there until returning to Dusseldorf, Germany to study painting. He taught at a private school in New Brighton, Pennsylvania and married Emma Bocking, daughter to fellow artist Adolph Bocking. Before the Civil War, Bott moved to Pittsburgh. He exhibited in 1859 at the first show of the Pittsburgh Art Association. From 1865-67, he had a studio downtown and lived in Lawrenceville. Soon after this, Bott spent much of his time riding packet boats and doing decorations. He remained active until 1880 when he retired to Phillipsburg, PA.

DOROTHY LAUER DAVIDS (AMERICAN, 1904-1980).

Born to a Pennsylvania-German family in York, Pa, Davids attended Edinboro College, Seton Hall College and took painting courses at Carnegie Institute of Technology (now Carnegie-Mellon University) where she studied with Samuel Rosenberg and Roy Hilton. She was a frequent exhibitor with the Associated Artists of Pittsburgh and the Mid-Year Show at the Butler Institute of American Art in Youngstown, Ohio. In the 1930's a traveling exhibition of her work was organized and her paintings were shown in a number of museums throughout the country. In 1933 she helped to organize the first Greensburg Community Art Exhibition, which later became known as the Greensburg Art Club. She exhibited annually until 1951 when she stopped painting. In addition to her career as an artists she was also the manager of the Greensburg Antique Show for many years, she played the violin and collected widely in the field of American antiques.

AARON HENRY GORSON (AMERICAN/LITHUANIAN, 1872-1933).

Immigrating to the United States at the age of 18, Gorson began his training at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts in Philadelphia. In 1899 he returned to Europe and studied in Paris at the Julian Academy. Gorson sought to provide the world with something new in his painting and felt Pittsburgh gave him that opportunity; with its visual appeal from great industrial growth, numerous hills and gracefully curving rivers. In 1903 he opened his first studio and made a specialty of painting scenes of the city. In 1921 he moved to New York and did landscapes of that region as well. A regular exhibitor at JJ Gillespie Gallery in Pittsburgh and the Associated Artist of Pittsburgh, he was also a member of the American Art Association of Paris and the Union International des Beaux Arts et des Lettres, Paris. Gorson's most famous paintings feature depictions of Pennsylvania's steel mills and factories.

GEORGE HETZEL (AMERICAN/FRENCH, 1826-1899).

Hetzel's family moved to Pittsburgh when he was just 2 years old. His parents encouraged his natural artistic talent, and he received his first training as an apprentice to a house and sign painter. Income generated from painting interior decorations for the old Western Penitentiary and for several river boats and cafes helped to finance two years of study at the Dusseldorf Academy. Although Hetzel did portraits and still lifes throughout his career, by the late 1850's his main concentration was on landscapes of the western Pennsylvania area. He was a frequent visitor at Scalp Level, an artist's retreat outside the city. Hetzel was the only Pittsburgh artist represented at the 1876 Centennial Exhibition in Philadelphia. In 1893 he sent three paintings to the Chicago World's Fair and he participated in the first Carnegie International in 1896. He taught at the Pittsburgh School of Design for Women and frequently took his students to the country to paint from nature. His final years were spent at his farm house at Somerset to which he had moved his family in 1897. Carnegie Institute presented a major retrospective exhibition of Hetzel's work in 1909, recognizing him as one of Pennsylvania's most significant artists.

MARY MARTHA HIMLER (AMERICAN, 1890-1982).

Himler was born in Greensburg, Pennsylvania. She graduated from Latrobe High School and attended Irving College in Mechanicsburg, Pa (now Beaver College), Indiana Normal School in Indiana, Pennsylvania (now Indiana University). She taught elementary school in Latrobe and for many years she commuted to Pittsburgh to study art in the evenings, weekends and summers at Carnegie Institute of Technology (now Carnegie-Mellon University). She graduated in 1928 and went on to do her graduate work in art at the University of Pittsburgh, then studied at Columbia University in New York, on a scholarship. In 1928 she began exhibiting with the Associated Artists of Pittsburgh where she was a consistent prize winner and for 28 years she organized a loan exhibition at Latrobe High School of work from the annual show.

MALCOLM PARCELL (AMERICAN, 1896 - 1987).

Born near Washington, Pennsylvania, where he lived for most of his life, Parcell entered the Carnegie Institute of Technology in 1916, where he studied under A.W. Sparks and George Sotter. While still a student, he painted the best portrait in the 1919 National Academy of Design exhibition in New York for which he received the Saltus Gold Medal. The award-winning portrait was titled Louine. Prior to painting Louine, Parcell spent a brief period in New York working as an illustrator for Scribner's. The artist J. Alden Weir bought one of his paintings and advised him to go home and paint his native area. In 1922 Parcell exhibited eight paintings in New York's Macbeth Gallery. The paintings got mixed reviews, but the artist was cited for showing great promise. That same year, The Tease was exhibited in the International Exhibition at Carnegie Institute. When the artist was 25, he had a show of ten paintings in the Gillespie Gallery. The paintings were sold out by the end

of the third day and critics pronounced the artist a prodigy. In 1937 he married Helen Louine Gallagher, a schoolteacher from Washington, Pa, who was the model for many of his paintings.

ALFRED BRYAN WALL (AMERICAN, 1861 - 1935).

A. Bryan Wall was still a young child when he began accompanying his father and uncle, Pittsburgh artists Alfred S. Wall and William Coventry Wall, to Scalp Level, an artist's retreat near Somerset, Pennsylvania. These experiences and his own independent study, guided by his father, was his only art training. His first exhibition was in 1879 at the National Academy of Design. Although he painted some portraits (including one of Andrew Carnegie and one of Mrs. Henry Clay Frick), landscapes were his most frequent subject. Wall had a studio in Philadelphia where he met Thomas Eakins, who painted his portrait. He was a trustee of Carnegie Institute from its inception in 1896 and served on the Fine Arts Committee helping to select the permanent collection.

WILLIAM COVENTRY WALL (AMERICAN/ENGLISH, 1810-1886).

Wall came to this country in the early 1820's with his family who settled in Mt. Pleasant, Pennsylvania. In 1843 he began making picture frames and selling artist supplies at J.J. Gillespie's Variety Store in Pittsburgh, a section of which was turned into a gallery and became a gathering place for local artist for over 100 years. He painted portraits for additional income and later began doing landscapes. Wall came to attention in 1845 for two oil paintings of Pittsburgh after the city was devastated by a fire in April of that year. Both were reproduced as lithographs and were widely distributed. Wall's best works are landscapes of the western Pennsylvania area. He was among the local artists who spent summers sketching at Scalp Level, accompanied in later years by his brother and nephew. In addition to local exhibitions, he contributed to an 1855 exhibition at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and the 1864 Pittsburgh Sanitary Fair for the benefit of Civil War veterans.

JACOB MAENTEL (AMERICAN/GERMAN, 1763-1863).

Jacob Maentel, born Johann Adam Bernhard Jacob Maentel in Kassel, Germany, immigrated to the United States in about 1806 at the age of twenty-eight after spending time in Napoleon's army as a secretary. He first settled in Baltimore where his occupation is listed as "Portrait Painter" in the 1807 directory and his address as "46 south, street". Sometime after 1807 Maentel began working in Southeastern Pennsylvania in the counties of Lancaster, York, Dauphin, Berks and Lebanon. This is where the majority of his portraits were painted over the next thirty years, before he and his family moved to New Harmony, Indiana where he would live out the remainder of his life. Since many itinerant portraitists did not sign their paintings, for the first half of the 20th century, most of Maentel's portraits were erroneously attributed to printer Samuel Endredi Stettinius. After the signed portraits of Rebeckah Jaquess and her husband, Jonathan, were purchased for the Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Folk Art Center in the early 1960's, thanks

to the scholarship efforts of Mary Childs Black and others, Maentel's prodigious works are now recognized as the important contributions to American Folk Art they are.

FRANK MELEGA (AMERICAN, 1905-1997).

Born in Diamond, Indiana, Melega moved with his family to West Brownsville, Pennsylvania in 1917. Melega's father was employed with the Lilley Mine of the Valley Coal Company, which became the inspiration for most of his paintings. The self-taught artist began his career working at various jobs including commercial art and sign lettering and by the age of twenty-three, he owned the Art Sign Shop located at the present site of the Brownsville Post Office on Charles Street. He first started exhibiting in 1933 and as a member of the Associated Artists of Pittsburgh in 1936. In 1952, he was invited to exhibit in the Carnegie International along with such iconic artists as Georgia O'Keefe, Jackson Pollock, Andrew Wyeth, and Willem de Kooning. Throughout his career Frank Melega taught art classes and painting workshops.

JACOB EICHHOLTZ (AMERICAN, 1776-1842).

Born in Lancaster Pennsylvania in 1776, Eichholtz attended the English School of Franklin College (now Franklin and Marshall College) with his brothers George and John, where he received lessons in drawing from a sign painter. In 1801 he was hired as a journeyman coppersmith by George Steinman and later advertised himself, along with his brother George, as "tin-plate workers", a venture he gave up in 1812. Throughout his life Eichholtz maintained associations and friendships with some of the most noted artists of the time including Thomas Sully, Gilbert Stuart, John Sartain, William Dunlap and Rembrandt and James Peale. His career as an artist spanned over three decades. During that time he painted portrait of such notable people as Governor and Mrs. Simon Snyder, Samuel Humes and his wife, the Reverend William Smith (a copy after Gilbert Stuart), Dr. Frederick Augustus Hall Muhlenberg, Judge Walter Franklin, Governor John Andrew Shulze, Samuel Humes, Dr. John Eberle, Bishop John Stark Ravenscroft, James Buchanan, Nicholas Biddle, Judge Thomas Emlen Franklin and his wife and many other prominent Pennsylvania families of the day. In addition, although being known more for his portraits, Eichholtz also painted several religious scenes including his rendition of The Last Supper and Crucifixion, landscapes including Conestoga Creek and Lancaster, and historical scenes including An Incident of the Revolution and Mark Antony delivering his oration over the body of Caesar (copy after Benjamin West). He exhibited at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in the Society of Artists of the United States, at the Concert Hall in Pittsburgh, at Peale's Baltimore Museum and in the First Annual Artist's Fund Society.

GLASS

Pittsburgh Glass – As a scholarly term, "Pittsburgh Glass" generally, and very broadly, refers to all the glass made in establishments in Southwestern Pennsylvania, Eastern Ohio and West Virginia in the late 18th and early 19th century. Pittsburgh became a glass manufacturing powerhouse during this period for a variety of reasons but chiefly because it inherently had all the necessary requirements; fuel, silica and potash. In 1797 James O'Hara and Isaac Craig launched their glass manufactory, the O' Hara Glass Works of Pittsburgh, the first of the pioneer glass-houses of the region to endure during a period of more than eighty years in the same location.

Pittsburgh Free-Blown glass – created using the broad glass, or cylinder, method, which was used primarily until late in the 19th century when the technique of drawing glass into sheets in a continuous process was developed. In this method a workman would blow a long cylindrical bubble. The ends of the bubble were cracked off with a hot wire or thread of glass then an iron tool dipped in cold water was applied. The cylinder was then split lengthwise and placed in a flattening oven where it could be softened and then shaped. Pittsburgh free-blown hollow ware generally shows several defining characteristics including, but not limited to, a bulbous shape, a predilection for applied bases, either in a funnel or baluster shape, tooled rims and if covered, the lid will have a bell-shape and a knob or flattened-knob finial.

Pittsburgh Pillar Mold glass - Articles were made with two layers of glass, generally both colorless. The first, or inner, layer was allowed to cool and harden somewhat then it was placed inside a mold. A second layer of glass was then blown into the same mold. Glass from the molten outer layer completely filled the lobe-like channels in the mold, creating solid projecting ribs in the finished vessel without making corresponding concavities inside the inner article.

New Geneva Glass – Despite difficulties between the large group of investors and glassblowers that first formed the New Geneva Glass Works in 1798 outside the village of New Geneva, Pennsylvania, it eventually won a reputation for superior quality to that of the then-struggling glass houses of Pittsburgh. In the beginning its main products were window glass and bottles and they were sold mainly in the expanding markets in the west and along the rivers. The hollow ware produced by New Geneva included utilitarian articles such as jars and bottles but also included pitchers, of various sizes, large and

small bowls, covered bowls, drinking vessels, especially for beer, ale, port and a variety of other spirits, and of course decanter bottles in non-lead green or light green.

Bottle glass – the simplest formula was silica, lime and potash. District glassmakers took whatever workable sand or silica they could find. Glass is green where iron oxides prevailed, brown where manganese was also present. Olive ambers resulted from varying proportions of those two minerals. Bottle factories were commonly called "green glass factories" though their products might range in color from the palest amber green to an almost opaque brown.

POTTERY

Liverpool Jugs – Liverpool pitchers, always called Liverpool jugs by collectors, are a form of transferware created in England in 1756. The technique is usually attributed to John Saddler (1720-1789), Liverpool England. Lore has it that one day Sadler, an engraver by trade, happened to witness a group of children playing with the discarded pieces of an engraving plate, transferring the images to miscellaneous pieces of broken pottery. Sadler quickly realized the potential of this discovery to an industry that relied solely upon hand-painted decoration. Partnering with Guy Green, another Liverpool printer, they established the Printed Ware Manufactory in 1756. Their technique however could not be kept secret for long, and soon other factories that had sent their wares to Liverpool to be decorated, were mastering the process and producing their own products. Thus the generic term for "Liverpool" was born. Many Liverpool pieces were made specifically for the American market and feature patriotic scenes and figures, Masonic themes and poetic trends popular at the time.

New Geneva Pottery – Early in the 19th century large, high quality, clay beds were discovered in southwestern Pennsylvania near the towns of New Geneva and Greensboro. Soon after this stoneware began to replace the traditional redware of the area and its appeal grew through the 1840's when the demand for Pittsburgh glass superseded it. In spite of its decline in popularity, New Geneva and Greensboro stoneware continued to be made into the early 20th century. New Geneva stoneware was made by a number of potters and uses both white and red clay. The white produced salt-glazed wares, the red a product which became known as tan ware. The salt glazed wares were typically decorated in blue underglaze or enamel over glaze, using

both free-hand and stencil designs including animals, birds, foliage, flowers and fruit as well as straight and curving lines. Tan ware was usually decorated in either black or dark brown. Many pieces were neither decorated nor signed. The most common forms were crocks, jugs, canning jars, pitchers, flowerpots and novelties.

WROUGHT IRON

Pennsylvania Wrought Iron - Ironworks appeared first in the Schuylkill and Delaware River valleys, then in Lancaster County and the Susquehanna valley. In 1716 Thomas Rutter erected the first bloomery forge in Pennsylvania along a tributary of the Schuylkill River. About 1720, Rutter and his partners erected the colony's first iron furnace, the Colebrookdale Furnace, which made better-quality iron more efficiently than a bloomery forge. About 1790 the Alliance Furnace emerged in Fayette County, one of the first iron furnaces west of the Alleghenies. Pennsylvania wrought iron is often identified by its decoration, a central motif of which is the heart, incorporated in both the handle design and accents.

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
